
Minibook Comprehension

1. Where is Otesha's home?

Read the Level 5, Week 9 Minibook, 'Otesha and the Golden Lion', and use your knowledge to answer these questions about the story. Remember, you can check back through the text to help with your answers.

2. The book tells us that impalas and zebras graze on the plains. What could 'graze' mean?

3. Why do you think the locals call the lion 'golden'?



Can you explain your ideas to the person sitting next to you?



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Adult Guidance

Please find below the reading comprehension questions and some handy talking points for your class after the children have read the minibook. These are designed to be adult-led and encourage discussion either one-to-one, in a small group or with the whole class.

1. Where is Otesha's home?

Answer: Kenya

Follow-up questions:

- Do you know where Kenya is?
- · Do you know about any other countries in Africa?
- The book says some amazing animals live in Kenya. Can you think of any animals that live in Kenya and not where we live?

2. The book tells us that impalas and zebras graze on the plains. What could 'graze' mean?

Answers might include: Eat. Look for food. Eat the grass. Keep eating all day like sheep

Discussion points:

- Do you graze all day like the impala and zebra?
- What do you think 'plains' are?
- · Lots of animals eat grass all day like impala and zebra. Can you think of any that live here?

3. Why do you think the locals call the lion 'golden'?

Answers might include: It is special. Its fur is golden. It is their favourite lion.

Discussion points:

- Does the name 'Golden Lion' make you think the locals like the lion or are they scared of it?
- Which animal was the biggest land mammal?
- Can you think of anything golden that we use? E.g. medals, trophies, jewellery.
